



The Contemporary Dayton Presents Three New Exhibitions that Challenge the History of Street Photography in Conjunction with the Multi-City FotoFocus Biennial

Featuring In-person and Streaming Artist Talks and a Masterclass from Teju Cole.

DAYTON (August 23, 2022) – The Contemporary Dayton (The Co) presents three new solo exhibitions featuring the work of **Teju Cole**, photographer, curator, Gore Vidal Professor of the Practice of Creative Writing at Harvard University, and former photography critic of *The New York Times Magazine*; **Amy Powell**, nationally published Dayton-based photographer; and **James "Jamie" Nares**, British and New York City-based filmmaker. The exhibitions will open the evening of Friday, September 16, 2022, with an Artist Talk by Teju Cole. Additionally, Cole will teach a Masterclass to area students on photography.

"One of photography's primary contributions is to deepen our understanding of the world and act as a literal record of the world around us," said The Co's Curator and Director of Programs, Michael Goodson. "We are excited to bring globally known artists, Teju Cole and James "Jamie" Nares to Dayton along with Dayton artist, Amy Powell, who each reexamine the concept of street photography."

The three exhibitions are presented as part of the 2022 FotoFocus Biennial. FotoFocus is a Cincinnati-based nonprofit organization created to celebrate and champion photography as the medium of our time. Through programming that ignites a dialogue between contemporary lens-based art and the history of photography, the Biennial is an ambitious month-long celebration of photography that unites the region's museums, galleries, universities, and non-traditional spaces. This year's Biennial showcases major new artist commissions and a wide range of original exhibitions, events, and projects, all centered around the theme of *World Record*. The theme considers photography's extensive record of life on earth, humankind's impact on the natural world, and the choices we now face as a global community.

PRESENTING TEJU COLE: BLIND SPOT

The Co is proud to present the work of Teju Cole, photographer, curator, Gore Vidal Professor of the Practice of Creative Writing at Harvard, and former photography critic of *The New York Times Magazine*. Culled from his ceaseless travels around the world, *Blind Spot* consists of a cycle of 34 photographs paired with Cole's insightful prose. With photos from locations including Zürich, Tripoli, Lagos, Seoul, Ypsilanti, Ubud, Brooklyn, and São Paulo, Cole's main focus is not on the extravagant landscapes themselves, but instead on finding the enigma of the mundane in each place. While each photograph is named by place, the short text interlinked with each may describe the specific moment or place of the image or may connect to a pathway into Cole's memory. However, each is considered as much as the image to which it is paired, a 1:1 ratio, which makes *Blind Spot* a literary as much as a photographic project.

The exhibition is on loan from Lannan Foundation, Santa Fe, NM and is organized by The Co as part of the 2022 FotoFocus Biennial. The exhibition is accompanied by signed copies the publication, *Blind Spot*, available at The CoSHOP and an Artist Talk on Friday, September 16, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. in the gallery and online.

In conjunction with the exhibition, The Co and University of Dayton partnered on a special program featuring Teju Cole who will teach a Masterclass on photography to a select group of students from Central State University, Sinclair Community College, Stivers School for the Arts, University of Dayton, and Wright State University on Saturday, September 17 at the Arcade Innovation Hub. Cole will study and critique photography and engage students in dialogue to seek out the potential of a deeper narrative.

PRESENTING AMY POWELL: WHAT ONCE GREW STRAIGHT, AND TALL T'WARD THE SUN, IS ABSORBING BACK DOWN, TO DIRT LIKE A SPONGE

The Co presents an exciting new body of work by Dayton-based artist, Amy Powell. What once grew straight... is made up of hundreds of images the artist selected from social media that were tagged "Dayton, OH," which she then printed and arranged specifically for the exhibition.

Working in the pictorial tradition of American photographers like Eugene Atget, Harry Callahan, and Emmet Gowin, Powell's intimate portraits center around her family. Noted for her use of vivid colors, precise composition, and evocative allure, Powell strives to capture the banal beauty of the suburbs. For this project, however, she turns the notion of artist/photographer/curator on its head, and selects other's images based on their striking composition, absurdity, poignancy, and visually compelling qualities; collectively creating a portrait of a place and its citizens living their lives during perilous times. Powell's work has been published nationally in *TIME* magazine, *The New York Times, The Washington Post, Elle, The Wall Street Journal, The Guardian*, and more.

Artist Talk: Amy Powell in conversation with Stacy Kranitz will take place on Friday, November 4, 2022 at 6 p.m. in the gallery and online. Stacy Kranitz is an American photographer who works in the documentary tradition, currently living in the Appalachian Mountains of eastern Tennessee.

PRESENTING JAMES NARES: STREET

The Co presents *STREET* by James "Jamie" Nares, a British artist living and working in New York City. Nares makes paintings and films and played guitar in the no wave group, James Chance and the Contortions, with Jim Jarmusch in the Del-Byzanteens, and she was a founding member of Colab.

STREET is a 61-minute video of New York City's streets and its people that has been edited from sixteen hours of continuous footage and then greatly slowed down. A love letter to Nares' adoptive home, the film slows the clamor of the city to a hypnotic effect. Originally produced in 2011 to be projected nightly on the Metropolitan Museum of Art's south-facing wall in Central Park, viewers encountering the spellbinding, slow-tracking video are reminded of the fabric of life that make cities everywhere so unique.

James Nares: *STREET* is on loan from the Paul Kasmin Gallery, New York, NY and is presented by The Co as part of the 2022 FotoFocus Biennial. Virtual Artist Talk: James Nares in conversation with Michael Goodson will take place online Friday, December 4, 2022, at 6 p.m.
